Michael Stubbs

Cornerstone Gallery - Cornerstone Building

This exhibition takes place in the Cornerstone Gallery, Cornerstone Building, Liverpool Hope University, Creative Campus, 17 Shaw Street, Liverpool, 16 1HP

Michael Stubbs has been a prominent and influential painter for over thirty years and currently teaches at the Glasgow School of Art where he is a Reader in Contemporary Painting. His varied work has touched on painting endgames, mutations of the grid, decorative excess, and the interweaving of process and abstraction. Since the early 2000s he has consistently used processes of visual layering as an open-ended, improvisatory painting style that shows fragmentations of signage and text.

Stubbs's paintings are constructed by combining poured, abstract configurations of transparent varnishes and opaque household paints with

ready-made graphic stencils. The repeated pouring, in conjunction with the signs, form a physical process of flat-on-flat layering that reveals multiple perspectives and optical depths. In this way the paintings work through a series of impulses, riffs, accidents, false-starts and changes of mind, to arrive at a moment of dynamic complexity that can't be planned. Stubbs has recently incorporated digital images of studio materials and tools to refer the viewer to the act of making a painting in the age of internet overload.

Michael Stubbs studied at Goldsmiths College (PhD 2003; MA 1990) and Bath Academy of Art (BA 1987). He has exhibited internationally since 1990 and solo shows include: Palfrey Space, London, 2021; Reid Corridor Gallery, Glasgow School of Art, 2020; Cornerstone Gallery, Liverpool Hope University, 2017; Hollenbach Gallery, Stuttgart, 2015 and 2006; Laurent Delaye Gallery, London, 2011 and 2010. 

Roberto Fabbriciani, flautist and composer, presents this concert for the centenary of the birth of Luigi Nono (1924 – 1990), as a tribute to the composer's desire to experiment and innovate.

The concert will close with Nono's work for bass flute and electronics Das atmende Klarsein, fragmente. This work was born from the composer's experimentation with Fabbriciani on the new expressive possibilities of a traditional instrument in relation to live electronics. The work was made at the Experimental Studio of the Heinrich-Strobel Stiftung in Freiburg, the studio where Nono made many of his works with electronics.

At the same studio in Freiburg, the electronic part of Roberto Fabbriciani's composition Omaggio a Luigi Nono for piccolo was made. It is a piece born in the same vein of Nono's: exploring the expressive potential of this instrument. Referring to the same spirit of research and experimentation, the concert opens with the work Passed/Passing by Stephen Davismoon, who is interested in what can be defined as a new virtuosity that consists in focusing on the analysis of the single sound.

Florence, a city known throughout the world for the richness of its artistic heritage, experienced a second renaissance in numerous arts in the twentieth century. In this context, in the second half of the century, Florence was an interesting central location for the meeting between music and new technology. In the 1960s, the cellist Pietro Grossi began experimenting with the use of the first computers in sound applications and from this interest he founded the first academic course in Italy for the study in computer music at the Conservatory of Music of Florence.

A few years later, in 1982, the composer Luciano Berio founded Tempo Reale in Florence, a center for research, production and musical education. Already in the early years of its foundation, the center carried out extensive research work for the creation of new tools for live electronics and participated in the production of numerous contemporary works, including some by Berio himself.

This concert presents a series of recent acousmatic works coming from this reality and whose purpose is to outline a cross section of this educational path, of the professional environment and of the cultural heritage of the city of Florence.

Resonating Stages - A Postgraduate Symposium

The 2024 edition of Resonating Stages, the Postgraduate Symposium by the School of Creative and Performing Arts, moves away from the traditional conference format and takes the form of a day of curated events conceived to nurture connection and stimulate discourse among our postgraduate community as well as provide moments of reflection and consolidation for all participants.

Reaching out across disciplines and into the past, we will be learning more about the origins of the institution we are part of with a talk by Oliver Mumford, a PhD researcher from the department of history who will be

sharing his recent work and curatorial approach to the exhibition Imperial Hope? Colonial pasts at Liverpool Hope University currently showing at the Sheppard-Worlock Library.

Following on from this, we will be exploring ways in which artistic practice might be engaged in the telling and processing of the complex and sensitive stories that emerge from this new perspective and understanding of the history of the University and its founding colleges. Taking potentially challenging pasts out of the archive, to highlight how they impact our present materialities, deepening our understanding of the processes and methodologies that work to activate change.

While considering the connections and interactions of the institution in relation to a much wider context, we would also like to use this process as an opportunity to reflect on the position of the Creative and Performing Arts within the academy, their importance in relation to critical thinking, the communication of thoughts and ideas and capacity to model collective assemblages to redefine what we are capable of doing.

The programme has been developed by PhD researchers from the School of Creative and Performing Arts, Fabiola Santana and Annabel Little under the mentorship of Associate Professor Silvia Battista. This event is open to all but due to the participatory nature of the event, ticket numbers are limited and booking is essential.

Warrington-Runcorn New Town Development Plan/ Sulk Rooms

Gordon Chapman-Fox works under the name Warrington-Runcorn New Town Development Plan (WRNTDP) and produces wonderful propulsive, cinematic electronica which has a musical, conceptual and aesthetic setting in the mid-1970s to early 1980s and has made a great impact since his debut in 2020.

Gordon has released four albums to date on independent label Castles in Space. His latest record, The Nation's Most Central Location has proved his most successful, charting at number 6 in the independent album chart and achieving much radio play and many requests for sync placements.

Following a solid upwards trajectory, all four WRNTDP albums have had increasing levels of critical and commercial success, with the third record Districts, Roads, Open Space charting at #20 in the UK vinyl album charts, and #60 in the main album chart. The album made several albums of the year lists, including Bleep, Norman Records, Piccadilly Records, Drift Records and made #5 in the Electronic Sound magazine 2022 best of list.

The Nation's Most Central Location was pressed in the largest edition ever issued by Castles in Space, and yet still sold out in a matter of days. Genuine public demand necessitated a repress of a further 2,000 copies, which had to be ordered immediately following the album's release.

Since performing at End Of The Road in 2022, Gordon has begun a definite move towards the mainstream consciousness, with his appearance there being noted in the Financial Times' review of the festival. His work is regularly played on the BBC and he was asked to contribute to Stuart Maconie's Freak Zone special of hauntology last year. He was included in Shindig Magazine's "ones to watch in 2023" feature, where they said "The richness of his visionary music is becoming progressively more enticing. A must for 2023". The campaign for this new album has seen major features in Electronic Sound magazine and The Quietus. The album was also given 8/10 in a review/interview piece in Uncut.

What's difficult to convey is how much these records have resonated with so many cross sections of the public. From electronica fans, to town planners, architects and academics, current and ex-new town dwellers, futurists and nostalgia freaks, the reach and affection for this music has been quite a revelation. In an adept development, the work has become more overtly politicised as Gordon reflects and refracts the broken promises made over generations to those in the North of England. Brought into sharp relief with the latest levelling up debacle, although of the past, the music couldn't be more current. It's emotional and moving and it connects deeply with many people.

A pseudonym of Yorkshire based composer Thomas Ragsdale, the music of Sulk Rooms draws the link between euphoric electronica and smoke engulfed drones.

Slow-morphing textures sequence and cascade, encapsulating intimate moments of colliding sound amongst fluttering arpeggios and transcending synth builds.

Atmospheric music for the head alongside the heart, Sulk Rooms' music captures spontaneous audio mirages and saturated imperfections within a crushing backdrop of low end and harmonic ferocity.

A stand-out piece tonight is the world premiere of a new work by Stephen Davismoon, based around an old Italian melody.

Here, in the space of one evening, you can travel over 400 years of music, written in or inspired by Italy.
